WELCOME TO DORNBIRN

ornbirn is situated at an altitude of 437 meters and is the most populous city in Vorarlberg with over 50,000 inhabitants. The districts of Markt, Hatlerdorf, Oberdorf, Haselstauden, Rohrbach, and Schoren, each with their own character, serve as residential, economic, and educational hubs, offering a high quality of life. The city's economic centers are located in the downtown area, as well as in the commercial and industrial parks of Fischbach, Kehlerpark, Rhombergs Fabrik, Schwefel, Steinebach, and Wallenmahd. The city center is characterized by an attractive shopping and entertainment scene, featuring over 150 stores, various dining options, and an event calendar filled to the brim with events that enliven the extensive pedestrian zone. In recent decades a well-known economic hub has developed in the southwest of the city. This includes the Messe Dornbirn exhibition area with trade fairs and events, Vorarlberg's largest shopping center Messepark and renowned retail companies. The 121 km² Dornbirn municipal area encompasses expansive forests, wetlands, mountains with peaks exceeding 2,000 meters, meadows, and alpine landscapes. Notable attractions include the impressive Rappenlochschlucht, one of the largest gorges in Central Europe, and the idyllic Walser village of Ebnit. •

The existence of asparagus in Vorarlberg is a small sensation, indirectly owed to strawberries and, in fact, the people at Winderhof. There's also a reason why Hotel Krone was the first to receive that asparagus.

In the world of culinary delights, there are often duos that may not seem compatible at first glance but harmonize in taste. Kässpätzle with applesauce is one such example, as are strawberries and asparagus. What many don't know is that this culinary pair also complements each other perfectly in cultivation. And indirectly, strawberries are also responsible for the presence of asparagus at Winderhof in Dornbirn for the past few years.

For many years, Winderhof, formerly known as Winder Beeren, has been particularly renowned for its excellent strawberries. A recommendation from a German colleague inspired Peter Winder to venture into asparagus cultivation.

"Operating the farm the way we do, can only be done with genuine enthusiasm," says Theresia Winder. Since the beginning, the product range has been expanding, with vegetables being added to fruits. The location also includes 18 student apartments. Therefore, renaming Winder Beeren to Winderhof was a logical step.

Winderhof follows the rhythm of nature and only harvests vegetables when they are fully ripe. Hotel Krone in Dornbirn is one of their







dear customers. Theresia Winder personally delivered the very first asparagus harvested at Winderhof to the hotel's managing director, Bettina Rhomberg.


The connections between Hotel Krone and Winderhof are diverse, since Peter Winder worked as a pastry chef at the hotel before dedicating himself to fruit farming. And their asparagus grows

on a field that the Winderhof has leased from the Rhomberg family. Hotel Krone, with its attached à la carte restaurant, is run by Bettina and Christine Rhomberg and is also a popular spot for locals who appreciate regional cuisine. Quality and seasonal variety take center stage on the menu, and the personal atmosphere is maintained despite having 111 rooms. "One of us is always here. We are not only hotel managers but also hosts," explains Bettina Rhomberg.

The close relationship between Hotel Krone and suppliers like Winderhof is a key to their success. Both sides understand each other's needs and challenges, leading to a successful partnership: "Understanding how we work helps comprehend why we can't always provide everything that is requested" savs Theresia Winder. "It's because we don't dictate the rhythm; nature does." ●

Enchanting Names and Historical Buildings

Rapunzel, roses, and beauty. At first glance, this route seems a bit enchanted. It starts at a striking yellow 1950s house on Bahnhofstraße. On the ground floor, a very special bookstore has set up its reading room: Rapunzel. As magical as the name sounds, so enchanting is the place. "The ambiance gives you the feeling of discovering something new over and over again. You could spend the whole night here, flipping through books," raves Heidi. Once you've found your favorite and are back on Bahnhofstraße, the next



eye-catcher is already in sight: an imposing Art Nouveau house from 1911 with narrow, tall windows and a beautiful gable. It has witnessed two world wars and has been lovingly preserved. It used to house the Luger furniture store, and today, several shops call it home, including Bitsche Augenoptik und Hörakustik. "Even now, everything in this venerable building revolves around beauty and exclusivity-nothing has changed over all these years."

After checking out Bitsche, instead of taking the usual route across the marketplace, turn right into Schulgasse. There, visit SASU - schöne Dinge von hier und anderswo. In this modern concept store, the history of the house is palpable, with original furniture making it more than present. "Almost 70 years ago, my mom bought pencils here and picked currants in the garden behind," Heidi tells us before we move on to the next stop.

Pay attention, lift your gaze when crossing the church park and the marketplace—there, too, the houses tell their stories from the past. Our destination is *LINGG MODEN* at the entrance to the marketplace. "Before immersing yourself in the world of fashion, take a few steps back and let the carefully preserved architecture of the townhouse work its magic," advises Heidi. The fashion hunt never ends, because just around the corner is Livid. Keep your eyes open because as you approach, a contrast awaits. Lots of glass, a dark facade, and a proud presence. "The new building confidently and stylishly integrates into the city's architecture. The neighboring house follows the same harmony." Where brides used to dress at Emi Schenk's, today they get their hair and makeup done. maischön - mir zuliebe, offers more than meets the eye: "The hair salon offers both styling services and shopping opportunities for passersby; even without styling, one can calmly stock up for home." Speaking of home: The last stop on Heidi's route is a treasure trove of beautiful things for the home. "Mary Rose is worth seeing inside and out. The fairy-tale rose that gives the store its name is naturally omnipres-


ent."We hope this route is a successful inspiration to take a different path on your next shopping spree.

Embracing Beauty

For those who still have a shopping itch, they can combine the first route with the second and walk from Mary Rose to Marktstraße. Alternatively, they can join at Ambros Fine Clothing. The house is hard to miss, standing out with its pale yellow color and artistic facade. "Inside and out, it's just a beautiful experience," says Heidi. And this harmony continues two houses down at Modehaus Zumtobel. "The house frames the shop window beautifully and dresses the store in a stylish cover." To maintain the lightness in the cityscape, O.Rein Uhren und Schmuck creates a stylish contrast across the street. "The company has an almost 150-yearold tradition dedicated to attention to detail and beauty." The ultra-modern shop conveniently bridges the gap to the present and the architecture of the neighborhood. Also nearby, practically next door, is Binder Buch und Papier. "This building is very old but burned down once and was rebuilt in a contemporary way," Heidi explains. "Through the details and connections, synergies with

> the beer garden next door have also emerged. Very harmonious and inviting." Next up is a very distinc-



tive house. At Juwelier Präg, not only does the shop window sparkle, but the entire building seems to glow. "Reopened towards the end of 2023, it immediately enhances the exclusive shopping experience," says Heidi about the house that used to be a bank. History is also present at our next destination. "Many people don't know that real printing presses are still running in the middle of Dornbirn. At Daniel Feurstein on Marktstraße, customers shop for stationery at the front while paper is printed at the back. The family business is now in its 4th generation, has been around for 150 years, and is an integral part of the city's history." In comparison, myinterior a few houses down looks like it's from a different time altogether. Yet, this house has a long history

in which design has always played the lead role. "Before myinterior took up residency, the house was home to an art gallery. Today, you'll find an exciting store with a café. Sometimes you don't know if you're sitting on a special coffeehouse piece of furniture or a work of art while sipping coffee." And if you take a closer look at the house, you'll see the tension even in the facade. "Furthermore, the beautiful journey to myinterior is worth it on its own. For instance, I always

make a stop at Elisabeth Lenz's flower workshop."

"Get rid of it, the old junk!" This was the common attitude towards old stock just over fifty years ago. However, the approach, not only to the built environment but also to history itself, has undergone changes, reflecting the spirit of the times. Dornbirn, as a young city and a focal point of diverse entrepreneurial energies, has many stories to tell, and people are listening. After the post-war years' euphoria, which aimed to leave everything old behind and only trust new ideas, the 1970s saw a noticeable search for regional identity and the form of one's own history across Europe. Initially faced with strong resistance, the trend began to shift towards not tearing down old Rhine Valley houses, such as in Hatlerdorf, but rather carefully transforming them. The preservation and re-purposing of large industrial areas in the heart of the city also emerged, giving rise to essential landmarks like the Sägen-Areal with the University of Applied Sciences or the former Rüschwerke, now housing inatura.

In addition, there is the global challenge of handling resources more carefully, whether it be land or building structures. In the world of architecture, there is a discussion about a shift from construction to renovation, and the enriching possibilities of this transformation are evident in a brief exploration around Dornbirn's station district.

Love and the railway brought Josef Weiss from Bolzano to Dornbirn, leading him to build a substantial bourgeois house across from the railway station established in 1872. Initially a residential building, from 1887 on he operated a wine trade and café on the ground floor, eventually turning it into Hotel Weiss with economic buildings and a barn in 1892. However, with the onset of World War I, all this came to an end. From then on the building had to serve other purposes and stood vacant for a long time.

Continue to Build

When architect Julia Kick acquired the barn, the ensemble was already under monument protection. What seemed like an obstacle to many in terms of use, she turned into

a virtue, incorporating outdoor and indoor spaces for her office and residence into the historic structure. In 2017, the sophisticated renovation was complete, allowing its history and construction to remain visible. The way to achieve this was clear, though with some details to resolve. The warm and dense envelope is not created externally but within the protected outer shell. Thus, a cozy loggia was positioned towards the side street behind the selectively opened facade, and the new terrace doors were recessed further inward. The interior cladding with lively-grained spruce plywood absorbed the patina of the existing structure, uniting old and new without abrupt breaks. This follows the concept of "continuation," allowing for a significantly more harmonious living experience compared to the

often dogmatic and radical contrast between existing and extension seen in the past.


Dialogue between History and Modernity

In a similar manner but as a new construction, the neighboring Hotel Flint was placed in 2022 between Julia Kick's economic building and the former Villa Josef Weiss. Marte.Marte Architects created a high-quality city hotel that positions itself between its architectural neighbors with balanced formal references and a well-composed individuality. A two-story base with a lobby, restaurant, and two conference rooms engages in an architectural dialogue with the villa, utilizing its spaces as hotel suites. This dialogue is also continued by the eleven-story hotel tower, fulfilling the long-planned extension of the adjacent residential tower from 1969. This was erected on a neighboring plot and, with a spacious passage on the ground floor, spread out like a mountainous landscape. Its architect, the Tyrolean Ernst Hiesmayr, also temporarily guided to Vorarlberg by his love for his wife from Wolfurt, left some distinctive marks in Dornbirn. With precise elegance and radical modernity, the WIFI building and, less known, the radically sculptural form of

and their team shaped and clad the new hotel. Using high-quality exposed concrete, they created a rhythm of flower-shaped window reveals, whose stems act as supporting pillars, structuring the generously glazed ground floor. This gentle and consistent movement of the facade establishes a modern connection to the historical decor of the villa and simultaneously to the constructive articulation of the existing residential tower. Sensitive sizes and proportions create a connection over 150 years of architectural culture.

Maselli-Areal "Walk on the Wild Side"

Demonstrating that building with existing structures allows for significant formal freedoms is architect Marc Hoffenscher, trained in Vienna and London under Wolf D. Prix and Colin Fournier. His project on the site of the former Maselli textile factory, just behind the train station, encountered a typical inventory of office buildings and various hall structures, that had seen numerous extensions over time. Together, the clients and architect achieved an efficient and sustainable







development, turning the rather prosaic environment into an attractive and design-oriented landmark. Four individual buildings were added to the expanded and elevated office building, and after the demolition of the hall structures, a green and spatially diverse ensemble was densified. For this, the existing tree population was preserved, or even moved, and half of the plot was kept free for later development. A layer of freely shaped facade elements connects the buildings into an urban large-scale form. However, the creative ambition was not limited to formal diversity and conceptual references but also found expression in a contemporary and thoughtful usage concept: large owner-occupied lofts, temporary small apartments for rent, co-working




space, and offices are complemented by features such as a communal room, workshop, barbecue area, and rooftop garden.

The Maselli-Areal, in the spirit of deconstructionist narrative joy, demonstrates, like the formally strict Hotel Flint and Julia Kick's almost romantic economic building, that smart concepts and contemporary architecture are compatible with sustainable existing use in any form.

istory always leaves traces. Traces in people, in buildings, in places, in street names. And when history is particularly influential, it leaves an entire trail in a city. This is what happened in Dornbirn—because Dornbirn was and still is the industrial hub of Vorarlberg. Just over 200 years ago, industrialization began here, with a bang. Dornbirn saw the construction of the first tulle factory, the establishment of the first mechanical weaving mill in the monarchy, and the largest weaving hall and silk spinning mill in Austria. Moreover, Emperor Franz Josef made the first telephone call in the mon-

Now, if you connect all, or at least many, of these historically significant places, you get a trail through the city. A kind of open-air museum along the remaining industrial buildings. The path leads from Gütle to Forach, straight through Dornbirn. 15 stations along a approximately 6.5-kilometer trail.

archy from Dornbirn.

Enthusiasts stroll along the Dornbirner Ach and the Müllerbach, marveling and discovering. They see historical buildings, but also currently operational businesses in the metal, electrical, and food industries. This is because industry has not disappeared from Dornbirn. It still shapes the city and its people, providing jobs, fostering innovation, and connecting history with modernity.

And this connection between the past and the present is crucial. History offers us an anchor. It demonstrates what our ancestors achieved. It allows us to look back with pride. It tells stories of people—innovators and engineers, workers, immigrants, and industrialists. But it also prompts us to critically question certain aspects and always keep the bigger picture in mind. And that's precisely what *STADTSPUREN* sets out to do. The trail plays a crucial role in conveying information and providing an opportunity to engage with what defines us—our history.

A trail, an app, and a book

But where and how can history enthusiasts gather information? At each historical stop of the STADTSPUREN trail, there is a plaque narrating the history of the place and addressing an important industrial theme. The agency sägenvier has meticulously designed the entire graphic identity. Furthermore, the 'i.appear' app, developed and implemented by Marilena Tumler, guides visitors from station to station, offering additional videos, interviews, or audio samples. It invites digital immersion into history, providing broad access to the past. And for those who wish to delve deeper into history, Dr. Klaus Fessler and Mag. Werner Matt's work is highly recommended. This richly illustrated and extensive publication allows one to explore and experience history with supplementary texts and illustrations by Nikolay Uzunov.

A Plot with an Eventful History

We don't start our journey on *STADTSPUREN* at the first stop. Nor do we continue it. Today, we linger at one place because it symbolizes the transformation brought about by industrialization. And with transformation or movement, everything begins. Around 1870, Dornbirn residents Franz Winder and Arnold Rüf moved a lot of rock and soil on the Boden plot along



the Dornbirner Ach. A level space was to be created where a spinning mill with a turbine facility could be built. The factory went into operation in 1883. However, it burned down in 1902, leaving only the outer walls standing.

After this tragedy, the Rüsch-Ganahl machine factory took over the site, converting the building into an electricity plant and turbine testing facility. The Francis-Spiral-Turbine 350B from that time is still preserved and now part of *STADTSPUREN*. During World War II, the Boden facilities came into the ownership of F.M. Hämmerle and fell into disrepair. Is this where the story ends?

Far from it, because in 1992/93, it became home to the 'Conrad Sohm'. A music club founded in 1984 by Hannes Rothmeyer and named after a Dornbirn toy store. More history. The nightclub made a name for itself as a stage for young bands and local celebrities, becoming well-known far beyond the

borders and achieving cult status. A historical place where current manager Hannes Hagen continues to make history.

STADTSPUREN splendidly demonstrates that life changes and people evolve, but history remains preserved. It shapes us and is worth engaging with. Get on the STADTSPUREN trail and see if you can find a part of your own history.

he city hall of Dornbirn has specialists working in all areas, dedicated to serving the citizens. What many don't know is that the municipality trains apprentices in five different areas. Yes, behind the historic walls of the city hall lies a young, dynamic, and versatile working environment. Since 2004, the city of Dornbirn has been recognized as an "Excellent Training Company" and has trained over 100 apprentices.

Depending on the apprenticeship, apprentices go through a rotation system, allowing them to switch to a new department every six months and learn something new. Currently, 15 apprentices are taking the opportunity to train at the city hall, hospi-

> tal, and forestry. There are five different apprenticeship options: Administrative Assistant, IT System Technician, IT Application Developer, Forestry Specialist, and Chef.


im and Kaisha are both doing an apprenticeship as Administrative Assistants at the city hall. Kim is in her 3rd year, and Kaisha is in her 2nd year of training. They both share a common love for numbers. That's why Kaisha prefers handling the accounting, while Kim's favorite task is processing payment orders. In addition to their specialized tasks, the two coordinate and organize various office activities, such as checking emails and handling bookings. "I am currently working in the Sports and Recreations department where I often accompany my colleagues to outdoor appointments at the

sports field. It makes for varied days. I think one should be flexible in our job," explains Kaisha and Kim adds "Unexpected things happen in the office all the time." Kaisha agrees, "We have so many different people here, so keeping an open mind is crucial." "And, of course, an orderly, organized way of working," says Kim. To balance her work, Kim is all about contrast: kick boxing in the summer and figure skating in the winter. Kaisha also has a full schedule: she is pursuing her apprenticeship with a diploma and loves to travel, especially to Spain. She can also imagine living there.







s soon as the phone rings, Anja is on the receiver. At the Telephone Switchboard, it's rarely quiet because it is the direct line to all departments of the city hall. This is what makes Anja's everyday work so varied and diverse. "In this profession, you have to enjoy dealing with people and need a professional demeanor. We have a very appreciative working environment, where you receive praise and support if mistakes happen." After completing school, Anja decided to pursue an apprenticeship as an Administrative Assistant with the city.

On one hand, because her years of schooling were credited, and on the other hand, because her dad assured her of a really good working atmosphere. "We apprentices are also allowed to help out at events occasionally, such as festivities for seniors or game festivals for children. Those are always special," Anja shares. If it were up to her, she would stay at the city hall for a long time and definitely on the career path she has chosen here. Anja recharges her energy reserves by riding horses or biking. On top of that, she is involved with the Landjugend youth organization.



ovana was uncertain about her future career during her time at Poly, but her teacher suggested applying to the city hall. During her internship she became completely convinced. Emine discovered the apprenticeship online and was excited about the rotation system. "This way, you get the opportunity to experience many different areas and take something from each of them." At the switchboard, she discovered a love for talking on the phone, even though she doesn't like picking up the phone in her private life. Jovana, on the other hand, enjoys making phone calls and is happy when she can help clients or colleagues. In the Care & Service department, she supports her team and is

Emine Karakurt from Dornbirn, Administrative Assistant (1st year apprentice with high school diploma) always there when things get hectic. "You have to be very focused in this field. But it's all the more beautiful when you can help others," she says. And for that, you occasionally receive a nice gesture in return. "I still remember a client who was really nice on the phone, asked about my day, and how I was doing. It's not a big deal, but it made my day," Emine shares. The contact with people is a huge plus in their job, making each day different from the other. Privately, Emine and Jovana enjoy being around people, preferably with friends and family. While Emine travels as often as possible for one or two days to explore new cities, Jovana loves to cook, bake, and **37** celebrate family gatherings.



"The best thing about the apprenticeship at the city hall is that, through the rotating system, you get to experience many different departments and learn something new every six months," adds Saliha. "And after the training, we can take on some tasks," says Milijana. Team spirit and appreciation are highly valued, which Rhea particularly appreciates: "One of the nicest experiences was when a colleague had retired, everyone had gathered in the penthouse to personally say goodbye to him." There are also regular outings and events for the apprentices, Milijana shares: "I fondly remember the city ball with the bad-taste theme. Especially the costume contest and the shared meal."



Dominik Bohle from Dornbirn, IT System Technician (2nd year apprentice)

hen the mouse or printer are acting up, Dominik is the man of the hour. Once the problem is entered into the internal ticket system, he and his team work to ensure that the tech at the workplace is up and running quickly. "There was once a case where someone was looking for a OneNote cable—which doesn't exist, of course. But usually, it's about replacing the screen, mouse or keyboard. By now, I can take on more tickets and even install a PC, check permissions, and so on," explains Dominik.

An interest in IT was always thereit set him apart from others applicants. "I asked many specific questions. That was noticed positively, I heard later." Dominik also brought prior knowledge from his first year at the technical college (HTL). However, the HTL was too much school and too little practical experience for him. His grandmother happened to discover the apprenticeship in the newspaper, and Dominik didn't hesitate to apply. Since then, he has learned a lot and had various experiences. "One of the best experiences was a company outing to Sonthofen. We visited the ski jump facility, had a shared meal, and went to the summer toboggan run." When Dominik is not solving IT problems, he still enjoys his time on the computer and playing on the PlayStation—after all, gaming is the **39** passion that led him to IT.





oritz's day starts at seven in the morning with a team meeting where he learns which area he is assigned to for the day. Most of the time, it's outdoors, and each day is different from the previous one. In forestry, the season often dictates the daily schedule: sometimes they distribute Christmas trees throughout the city and build wooden deer for the Christmas market, other times they plant young trees. Choosing a single favorite task is not easy, but Moritz appreciates the variety in his job. "It can be challenging at times, so you should definitely bring motivation. "I don't feel like it—is not an option," he says. The team is not deterred

by a bit of rain or snow because everyone is well-equipped. Moritz was given his own personal protective equipment. And every year, he receives a new chainsaw—a top model, of course—and participates in various apprentice or team events. "We had a company outing to our boss's house. He always talks about his wood chip heating and wood gasifier, so he invited us and gave us a little tour." When Moritz is not working for the city of Dornbirn, he helps out at home on the farm. And to ensure he never gets bored, Moritz plans to pursue another apprenticeship after completing his training as a Forestry Specialist. The specific field is still undecided.

tir-fry with crisp vegetables and authentic flavors is Justin's favorite dish, and it even made it onto the menu this week. "We're encouraged to contribute ideas, and sometimes we actually get to cook them," he explains proudly. The love for cooking runs in his family, passed down from his grandmother and grandfather, and his brother is also a chef. "The most important things in this job are dedication, flexibility, and a willingness to learn. There are situations where you need a lot of patience and a team you can rely on", says Justin, who starts his day at 6 a.m. in the large kitchen, where things can get busy. That's why he also enjoys working in the 'Cold Station' from time to time. In

that room, cold dishes are prepared, and the best part is that Justin can listen to his favorite music there. His apprenticeship in the hospital kitchen was exactly what he was looking for, even during the trial period. "I liked it right away. I remember it like it was my first day." He also recalls his most memorable experience: "It was when I received feedback for the first time that my food now tastes like that of a professional chef." After his apprenticeship, Justin wants to pack his bags and explore the kitchens of other countries during a world trip. But while he's still here, he regularly showcases his (vegan) culinary skills at the youth meeting point 41 in Altach.



'How to get through the evening on a shoe
string budget,' he takes us on a culinary

Here, people meet for the obligatory after-work beer, and sometimes treat themselves to the legendary toast. Or one of the regional specialties like a rag salad, hash browns, or a mixed grill. Today Alexander Waltner orders a hot pancake soup, which he enjoys in the cozy atmosphere.

At Gasthaus Gemsle, one prefers to go all out—the delicious dishes and the good wines are almost irresistible. "Even the ambiance is already an experience in itself." RISTORANTE PIZZERIA ETNA

"The family run restaurant is ideal for an outing with the whole family because everyone will find something to their taste on the huge menu."

CHINA RESTAURANT KAISER

We add to our list of institutions in Dornbirn the possibly first 'Chinese emperor' of the city: "China Restaurant Kaiser has always served the best spring rolls and sweet-sour soups." Above all, a visit is perhaps the most inexpensive way to immerse oneself in another culture. From the outside, it's hardly noticeable, but stepping inside the Restaurant, you enter an exotic world.

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MASALA KITCHEN

Alexander Waltner continues his exotic journey and pays a visit to Masala Kitchen to send his senses to India. The food smells as it tastes: excellent! "The naan bread comes fresh from the tandoori oven—a real rarity!" And the menu will also delight those who follow a meatless diet. About half of the dishes are vegetarian. The perfect opportunity for a light lunch break. "Except for the naan bread, you might want to hold back a bit."


LE JASMIN

Contemporary Art Meets Industrial Charm

The former assembly hall in Dornbirn's city park doesn't conceal its history, which began in the heyday of industrialization, and over the past 20 years has become a haven and counterpart for artistic projects. The non-profit association, Kunstraum Dornbirn, showcases projects specially designed for the space and tailored to its architectural conditions. This unique place captivates many international artists precisely because of its unrestored character and the considerable dimensions of the interior, bringing them to Vorarlberg with their compelling works. The former functional building offers ideal conditions for large-scale installations and enormous sculptures. The three exhibitions per year are accompanied by events that make art accessible to many: from children's workshops to conversations with artists, guided tours for kindergartens or schools to after-work tours, there is something for all age groups.

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Chiharu Shiota – "Who am I Tomorrow?"

Highlights from the Program

Chiharu Shiota is a rising star in the international art scene and is constantly on the move worldwide. However, the historical hall of Kunstraum Dornbirn fascinated her from her first visit. Under the title "Who am I Tomorrow?" she developed an installation in 2023 specifically for Dornbirn. The installation, consisting of 4,500 red threads sus-

pended like a living organism, was seamlessly integrated into the architecture.

Thomas Feuerstein works with his fascinating experimental setups at the intersection of artistic expression, applied science, and practical philosophy. In 2018, the Austrian artist transformed the space at the Kunstraum into a walkable sculpture with an expansive organism.



Hans Op de Beeck

In 2017, Belgian artist *Hans Op de Beeck* created a fictional, monochromatic, mystical garden landscape around a centrally located pond. Surrounded by trees and monumental stones, interspersed with sofas, the artist created an atmosphere that seemed detached from our earthly perception of time.



From Industrial Wasteland to a Place with Cultural Radiance

In 1893, the large assembly hall made of brick was erected on the Rüschwerke company premises. It served for the assembly of larger machines after Rüschwerke specialized in turbine construction in the 1880s, and the dimensions of turbine impellers and systems kept growing. The operation was closed in 1984.

In 1999/2000, the transformation of the old industrial site was announced in an international landscape planning competition. Important buildings from the heyday of Rüschwerke, such as the assembly hall, could be preserved. With the presence of the natural museum *inatura*, the *Kunstraum Dornbirn*, and the surrounding park with its trees and meadows, a space was established in the heart of the city, providing a high level of quality for residents and visitors alike.

C.ART

O Dr. Anton Schneider Straße 28b

The 'C' stands for contemporary. The c.art gallery, founded in 1989 and led by Belinda Boch-Prantl and Johannes Boch, focuses on contemporary art exhibitions, including painting, photography, video, installations, objects, and sculptures. Occasionally, representatives of classical modernism are also featured. In the gallery's own small publishing house, the couple publishes catalogs, art calendars, and postcards. Particularly interested visitors can also become members of the gallery's circle of friends.

FLATZ MUSEUM

The FLATZ Museum, located in the premises of the former Natural Museum, is based on an endowment of works by the artist FLATZ to the city of Dornbirn. It showcases rotating exhibitions focusing on photographic art, organizes readings, lectures, discussions, and performances. The collection includes key works by the artist from 1975 to 1999 and is supplemented by private loans.

The inatura is a unique museum that makes research, natural science, and technology interactively accessible. Visitors explore the habitats of Vorarlberg through experiments, exhibits, films, and interactive presentations. Interactive stations highlight the tension between life and experience areas and provide insights into the wonders of nature, humanity, and its technological achievements. The permanent exhibition combines historical industrial architecture with an entertaining Science Zone.

The centerpiece of the exhibition is the historic brewing system from the 19th century, originally from the Satteins
Gasthausbrauerei Schäfle. Heinz Huber acquired the system in 1989 and restored it for the new museum.

Furthermore, an internationally significant textile pattern archive with over 300,000 objects is available for research purposes.

At the same time, the house, with its different spaces—the Dora and Bira concert and theater halls and



the Oba, Dora, and Bira foyers—offers a vast range of event possibilities. Wolfi Preuß raves about the technology, the moveable walls, the stages, and mobile stairs, in short, the multifunctionality of the house of culture.

Making People Happy

For over a year now, Wolfi Preuß has been both organizer and gastronomer at the house of culture. In this short time, he and his team have managed to revitalize the place with events for all ages and tastes. Theater, comedy, concerts, lectures, celebrations, or 'Hörbar' and 'Tanzbar zum Quadrat', just to name a few. What brings Wolfi Preuß the most joy, he says, is seeing how people are embracing the new life in the house of culture. He plans to expand the range of events with conferences, presentations, company events, or Christmas parties. The venue offers so many possibilities, and with their own gastronomy, Wolfi Preuß and his team can offer everything from small bites to fine dining in the future.

A Look into 2024

The event calendar is well-filled. Every year, classical concerts, graduation balls, brass

band concerts, or school events are on the program. However, Wolfi Preuß has already ensured the first new highlights. None other than *Josef Hader*, as well as *Kernölamazonen* and *Gregor Meyle* are set to perform.

And then in July, he sets the stage for a big *public viewing* event in the Kulturhaus park of the *European Football Champion-ship*. Five nights of football, three concerts, and comedy. That's the plan. The team will serve at standing tables, and standing places will be available on the amphitheater steps and around it. A large bar and the Emma & Eugen food trucks will provide everything for refreshment. In short, Wolfi Preuß and his team are pulling out all the stops to create unforgettable moments. We are excited and looking forward to it!

positive effects: "As a Dornbirn resident, I am closely connected to the city and spend a lot of time in the Achauen. Therefore, it's nice when we as a bank can give something back to the region with this project, and many people can enjoy a beneficial stay in our beautiful recreational area." In any case, 50 oak trees will contribute to ensuring that the people of Dornbirn have a healthy forest on their doorstep in the future. •

FROM GOOD

ince April 2023, Jonas Hardege has been running *Tonhalle Dornbirn* in Hatlerdorf. Here, pottery enthusiasts can engage in independent pottery. In classes, interested individuals are taught the appropriate techniques, and in the shop, pieces showcasing potential outcomes are sold. Finished pieces can be fired in Jonas's kiln. The concept thrives with the support of the Tonhalle family and the enthusiasm for this type of craft.

The sign 'Tonhalle' is prominently displayed on one of the older houses in Hatlerdorf. Pushing open the door reveals a spacious, friendly room reminiscent of a dance hall. On the left, there's a counter and a shelf with pottery available for purchase, along with gift vouchers just in case. On the right, generous tables invite independent pottery. When holding a lump of clay in your hands, the question arises: What will it become?

A sheep or a bowl? A cow or a ring? A teddy or a plate? Sometimes, you only know once it stares back at you as a finished piece.

Further back, pottery is done on the potter's wheel. The round clay blank must be perfectly centered on the wheel so that the bowl or mug doesn't become asymmetrical. Then, using the finger, create a hole straight down into the clay, making it large enough for the interior of a vase or cup to take shape. Pull up the edge with precision and, most importantly, stop before concentration wanes and the finger or tool ends up in the wrong place.

"Our first class was fully booked within two days," says Jonas, the owner of Tonhalle Dornbirn. The 34-year-old studied geology in Vienna and became familiar with the city's ceramic workshops. He befriended Stefanie Koemeda, a ceramic artist and owner of Tonhalle Wien. Together, they developed the idea of bringing the concept to Vorarlberg through a partnership. "The open workshop currently works better in Vienna. The audience there is a bit younger and perhaps more experimental. Here in Vorarlberg, people have more space at home, even for their own studio," reflects Jonas after a year of Tonhalle in Hatlerdorf. "Hence, they do pottery at home instead of coming here. But, of course, it's also about the exchange, the communal activity and the special atmosphere. In contrast, the classes for adults and children are thriving."

Jonas has many helping hands, some official and others in exchange for free workshop use. For example, there's Anna Wieser, who constantly evolves Tonhalle with her creativity, Mario Feurstein, an experienced potter who leads classes, or Mira König and Thomas Wretschko, who found their love for pottery and their way into the team.





A firing service is also offered. In one, usually two, rounds, the clay is fired, and a colored glaze is applied. There is almost everything: black, white, red, brown clay, and a colorful variety of glazes. Every time a piece comes out of the kiln, it's a surprise, even for Jonas, despite having experienced it so many times.

Many entrust themselves to the relaxing feeling of their hands on wet clay and their intuition during the creative process. During this process, ideas ranging from oil lamps and rabbits to dinosaurs, vases, bowls with a white-blue rim, lunch boxes, and plates have emerged. What might have already stood on the shelves here? According to Jonas, there can be much more.


pleased, maybe even a little proud. Because the skate community came preparded and present the project organizers with mini gift skateboards as a sign of appreciation.





And every time, Dieter discovers something new.


